Houghton Library Visiting Fellowships

The Visiting Fellowship program offers scholars at all stages of their careers funding to pursue projects that require in-depth research on the library's holdings, as well as opportunities to draw on staff expertise and participate in intellectual life at Harvard.

Houghton provides fellows with access to other libraries at the University, and opportunities to exchange knowledge and promote their research through its publications, and scholarly and public program

Fellows receive \$3,600 stipend and are expected to be in residence for 4 weeks (not necessarily consecutive)

COMMUNITY-BASED RESEARCH PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION GRANT PILOT PROGRAM

The Community-Based Research (CBR) Grants Program at the University of Utah seeks to support research partnerships between academic researchers and community-based partners that inquire into and address real-world issues through an approach rooted in equity and inclusion. The University of Utah recognizes the value of CBR as a method for enriching our understanding of the world while also increasing social impact by advancing scientific knowledge within contextualized practice, guiding community and economic development, impacting policy, fostering learning, supporting organizing and movement building, and enhancing trust between academic institutions and communities harmed by past research.

CBR Project Implementation Grants are designed to support projects that are based in an established partnership with community partners and have been designed in collaboration with partners. This call for proposals is a pilot launch of the CBR Project Implementation grant program. Future program details, deadlines, etc. are subject to change based on feedback from the pilot launch. Information for applicants seeking grants to support the formation of new community partnerships will be provided later in the 2022-2023 academic year. Applicants to the CBR Project Implementation grant program are highly encouraged to complete the "Principles and Practices of Community-Based Research (CBR) at the University of Utah" REd course prior to applying for any CBR Program.

AMERICAN PHILOSOPHICAL SOCIETY FRANKLIN RESEARCH GRANT

"PROMOTING USEFUL KNOWLEDGE"

Founded in 1743 by Benjamin Franklin, the American Philosophical Society (APS) was created to promote useful knowledge. They are headquartered in Philadelphia, PA, close to Franklin's house. Historical members of the APS include Alexander Hamilton, Charles Darwin, Willa Cather, Marie Curie, Albert Einstein, and Barbara McClintock.

Today, the APS supports research and discovery through grants and fellowships, lectures, publications, prizes, exhibitions, and public education. They serve scholars through a research library of manuscripts and other collections internationally recognized for their enduring historic value.

The Franklin program is particularly designed to help meet the costs of travel to libraries and archives for research purposes; the purchase of microfilm, photocopies, or equivalent research materials; the costs associated with fieldwork; or laboratory research expenses.

Fellowship for Research in London

This program provides a fellowship between 1-2 month's research in the archives and libraries of London. Applicants are expected to have a doctorate or to have published work of doctoral character and quality.

Fellowship for Research in Edinburgh

This program provides a visiting fellowship between 2-4 months for research in Edinburgh in any aspect of humanities and social sciences. Applicants are expected to have a doctorate or to have published work of doctoral character and quality.

NSF PARTNERSHIP WITH SOCIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH COUNCIL



20 MILLION IN FUNDING

The U.S. National Science Foundation is partnering with the Social Science Research Council to support research that advances scientific knowledge about public health guidance and its impact on the health and well-being of individuals and communities.

The Social Science Research Council (SSRC) will donate up to \$7.5 million to NSF over the next two years to support fundamental research exploring the effects of public health guidance on society. NSF will invest \$12.5 million for a combined total of up to \$20 million in research funding.

NSF and SSRC invite research proposals that can reveal the complex factors that contribute to effective public health guidance and provide rigorous evidence that will be useful for decision-makers seeking to improve and protect the health of their communities.

Located on the edge of the Mediterranean Sea, the Camargo Foundation was founded by American artist and philanthropist Jerome Hill. Since 1971, esteemed panels of scholars and art professionals have selected 18 individuals or teams each year from hundreds of submissions around he world. These winners are awarded residencies in a stunning environment that fosters creativity, research, and experimentation.

The Camargo Foundation hosts a number of partnership programs throughout the year, which are programmed and produced in collaboration with several partners in the United States and in Europe.

Camargo Core Program

Scholars: Scholars should be connected to the Arts and Humanities working on French and Francophone cultures, or cross-cultural studies that engage the cultures and influences of the Mediterranean region.

Thinkers: Accomplished professionals in cultural or creative fields, (such as urban planners or scholars) who are professionally engaged in critical thought

Artists (all disciplines): Artists should be the primary creators of a new work/project and should have a track record of publications, performances, exhibitions, credits, awards, and/or grants. We are interested in artists who have a fully developed, mature artistic voice. Applicants may include artists who are engaged in critical thought and research-oriented projects.

Collaborative teams of up to three are welcome to apply

Duration: 6-11 weeks

Stipend: \$1060 per month plus housing & travel

Application: Due in October

Located in Cassis, France, on the edge of the Mediterranean Sea, the Foundation offers time and space in a contemplative and supportive environment, giving residents the freedom to think, create, and connect.



NATIONAL GALLERY OF ART

CENTER FOR ADVANCED STUDY IN THE VISUAL ARTS

Located on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., the National Gallery of Art is home to more than 130,000 works of art. Within the National Gallery of Art, the Center for Advanced Study in the Visual Arts is a research institute that promotes the production, use, and cultural meaning of art, artifacts, architecture, urbanism, photography, and film worldwide. The Center is a research institute that welcomes approximately 40 fellows from around the globe every year. The Center's programs include fellowships, internships, meetings, research, and publications. These are privately funded through endowments and grants to the National Gallery of Art.

Fields of Study: The Paul Mellon and Ailsa Mellon Bruce Senior Fellowships:

supports research in history, theory, and criticism of the visual arts

(painting, sculpture, architecture, landscape architecture, urbanism, prints and drawings, film, photography, decorative arts, industrial design, and other arts) of any geographical area and of any period.

The Samuel H. Kress Senior Fellowships:

supports research on European art before the early 19th century.

The William C. Seitz Senior Fellowship:

supports research on modern and contemporary art

Senior Fellowships are for full-time research, and allow scholars to participate in activities of the Center. With a maximum stipend of \$50,000, senior fellows also receive housing near the National Gallery if available.
