Funder Spotlight

The National Endowment for the Humanities' (NEH) Summer Stipends program aims to stimulate new research in the humanities and its publication. The program works to accomplish this goal by:

- Providing small awards to individuals pursuing advanced research that is of value to humanities scholars, general audiences, or both
- Supporting projects at any stage of development, but especially early-stage research and late-stage writing in which small awards are most effective

Summer Stipends support continuous full-time work on a humanities project for a period of two consecutive months. NEH funds may support recipients' compensation, travel, and other costs related to the proposed scholarly research.

Headquartered in New York City, the William T. Grant Foundation invests in high-quality research focused on reducing inequality in youth outcomes and improving the use of research evidence in decisions that affect young people in the United States.

Core programs include a Scholars Program and two grants focused on their core mission.

The Scholars Program supports career development for promising early-career researchers. The program funds five-year research and mentoring plans that significantly expand researchers' expertise in new disciplines, methods, and content areas.

The foundation seeks studies that aim to build, test, or increase understanding of programs, policies, or practices to reduce inequality in the academic, social, behavioral, or economic outcomes of young people. We prioritize studies about reducing inequality on the basis of race, ethnicity, economic standing, language minority status, or immigrant origins.

Using Evidence

The foundation seeks studies that identify, build, and test strategies to enhance the use of research evidence in ways that benefit youth. We are particularly interested in research on improving the use of research evidence by state and local decision makers, mid-level managers, and intermediaries.

SUMMER WRITING RETREAT

WHAT DO FACULTY DO AT A SUMMER WRITING RETREAT?

The Summer Writing Retreat is a free resource for all faculty at the University of Utah. It provides you with a set time to focus on your writing. Many of the faculty who attend the retreat are focused on writing fellowship and/or grant applications, but the retreat also supports scholars developing larger projects (e.g., book proposals).

The retreat focuses primarily on developing, revising, and receiving feedback on your writing. That is, the bulk of our time will be spent writing and receiving feedback on that writing. It is designed for both those who have no experience crafting grants/fellowships and seasoned grant/fellowship recipients looking for time to work with access to feedback.

WHO: all University of Utah Faculty

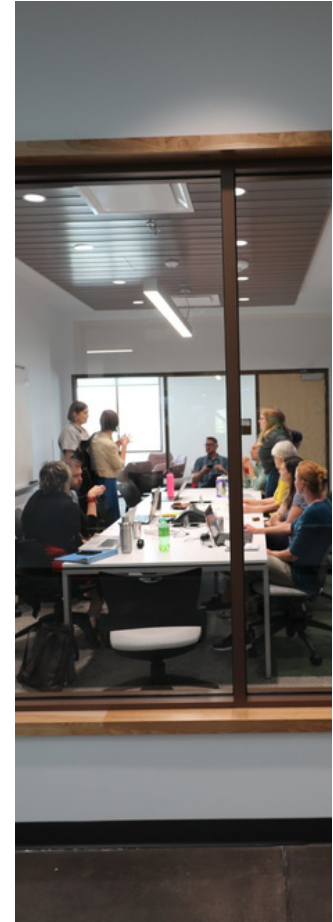
WHAT: A 2-day writing retreat focused on grants, fellowships, or big projects
